Course Description

Special Topics

In-depth analysis of current and emerging issues in criminal justice (lower division).

The goal of this course is to introduce students to work habits, skillsets and attitudes that promote academic and professional development. The course engages students in the use of critical thinking skills in evaluating their interests, values, and skills to understand how personal characteristics influence academic and professional success in the field of criminal justice. There will be a strong emphasis on the development of oral and written communication skills. CCJ 2094 is an elective course. There are no required prerequisites.

Required Texts/Materials

No textbooks are required. Readings will be made available on Canvas.

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course students will be expected to:

- 1. To build and encourage personal, social, and academic growth.
- 2. To develop and practice academic success skills.
- 3. To build supportive relationships within the classroom.
- 4. To provide an overview of the university's resources and services
- 5. To develop and strengthen writing and critical thinking skills
- 6. To develop skills in reading and assessing scholarly research in criminal justice
- 7. To explore different careers in the field of criminal justice
- 8. To examine the influence professionalism and positive human relations have on personal, academic, and career success
- 9. To develop short-term and long-term career goals

Course Evaluation Method

<u>Class Participation</u> - It should be understood that your class participation grade is based on a combination of attendance and participation. Merely coming to class each day will yield a minimally passing grade for participation, while missing more than two classes will negatively affect your participation grade.

<u>Discussion Posts and Reflective Essays</u> – There will be periodic discussion questions and other brief writing assignments. Details regarding these assignments will be provided in class.

<u>Career & Professional Development Portfolio</u> –Throughout the semester you will be compiling an academic/career plan through a variety of separate assignments. The final course portfolio will showcase your personal and professional growth, your "blueprint" for creating a successful path from student to professional, your reflections and self-assessment. Specific guidelines for the assignment will be given in class.

Oral Presentation – At the end of the semester students will present their course portfolios to the class

Elective courses in the major must be completed with a grade of "C-" or better. A grade of "D+" or lower in general elective courses does not satisfy any graduation requirement and will not count toward the 120 credits required for a degree.



Code of Academic Integrity

Students at Florida Atlantic University are expected to maintain the highest ethical standards. Academic dishonesty is considered a serious breach of these ethical standards, because it interferes with the university mission to provide a high quality education in which no student enjoys an unfair advantage over any other. Classroom Etiqutte

A quality learning experience rests heavily on a high degree of class participation. It is expected that students conduct themselves in a professional manner at all times (in person and via online communications). Students are graded on class participation. More than 2 unexcused absences will reduce your participation grade.
