- o Develop your appreciation and understanding of dance as an art form.
- Cultivate an understanding of kinesthetic awareness, body alignment, posture, strength, coordination, and flexibility.
- Learn to observe, engage, discuss, and write about dance as human expression.

- o Students will gain an understanding of the basic modern, classical ballet, and jazz dance technique.
- o Students will be able to distinguish the stylistic differences between the three different styles.
- o Students will be able to recognize basic terminology used in dance training.
- o Students will develop a stronger sense of physical strength, flexibility, coordination, and kinesthetic awareness.

Course Evaluation Method

Exams and Assignments:

There will be 3 technique evaluations (modern, ballet, and jazz). Each technique evaluation will be held during class and will be representative of the material covered in the previous 4 weeks.

There will be 1 terminology test during the semester and 2 dance concert review assignments.

Grading Policy:

As this is a practical course, students will be evaluated primarily on class participation, improvement of skills, and proof of understanding and performing materials presented in class. There will be 3 movement evaluations (modern, ballet, and jazz). Each movement evaluation will be representative of the material covered in the previous 4 weeks. There will be 1 terminology test during the semester and 2 dance concert attendance requirements with reflection assignments.

The distribution of points will be as follows:

Modern Dance Technique Evaluation (25%)

Classical Ballet Technique Evaluation (25%)

Jazz Dance Technique Evaluation (25%)

Terminology Test (10%)

2 Dance Concert Reviews (15% at 7.5% each)

Each student will be required to attend and write a 300-500 word (or an equivalent) reflection on the Florida Atlantic University Department of Theatre and Dance semester dance concert and a live dance performance in the community. Students should approve the community dance concert with the instructor for approval prior to attending or securing a ticket.

Code of Academic Integrity

Students at Florida Atlantic University are expected to maintain the highest ethical standards. In general, students may miss three classes (excused or unexcused) without penalty. Three tardies (up to fifteen minutes after the lesson's start time) will be equal to one absence. Arrivals after fifteen minutes will be equal to an absence. **Every absence more than three will lower your final grade by one letter**. The best way to learn is to participate and observe. Please be sure you are on time for class each day. Your reading and response preparation and overall participation is expected for each class period. You are responsible for contributing to the learning environment as your insights, research, experiences, and perspectives broaden the knowledge and understanding of everyone in the class.

3 Classes Missed (excused and unexcused) shall be permitted with no effect on the final grade.

Absences beyond 3 shall have an effect on the final grade as follows:

- 4 Missed Classes lower the grade one full letter
- 5 Missed Classes lower the grade two full grades
- 6 Missed Classes lower the grade three full grades
- 7 Missed Classes Students will not receive credit for a course who have accumulated

If you have an urgent reason to miss class, or are sick on the day of class, contact the instructor in advance whenever possible. Within a week of missing class, submit late assignments or make-up work as agreed upon with the instructor. Please talk to the instructor about the most appropriate way to do this.
