### Course Description

#### Chamber Music Literature 1

Prerequisites: Successful completion of all requirements for MVK 2421 or permission of the instructor
This course is an in-depth study of chamber music literature from the Renaissance period to the Romantic era. Special emphasis is placed on exploring period instruments, chamber music repertoire and performance practice.

Students will examine the development of chamber music from the Renaissance through the Romantic era, highlighting major composers, styles, and representative works. Through lectures, readings, guided listening, and analysis, students will explore the evolution of musical forms, stylistic trends, and performance practices.

- Examine the style of representative works by the composers studied in class.
- Broaden knowledge of chamber music from the Romantic period to the 21st century.
- Recognize representative works and/or composers of each period of music by examining scores and listening to recordings.
- Become familiar with works suitable for performance or teaching.
- Provide information about the latest applications and websites enhancing the knowledge of chamber literature
- Provide students with the opportunity to meet with and observe successful chamber musicians from across the globe.
- Prepare educational professionals who can work together, build partnerships, learn from one another, and accept responsibility.
- Prepare professional musicians who are able to access their own strengths and weakness, possess the attitude and skills necessary to learn, change and be lifelong learners.
