In-person: Traditional Concept of in person. Mandatory Attendance is at the discretion of the instructor.

## Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

Students will develop the skills necessary to perform operatic and musical theatre scenes with authenticity and confidence. Through movement, dramatic analysis, and character development, they will integrate acting techniques with vocal performance, refine their stage presence, and cultivate expressive, organic use of language. By applying improvisation, subtext, and rehearsal strategies, students will enhance their ability to deliver believable and compelling performances.

#### Course Evaluation Method

Grading:

30% Attendance & Active Participation – Regular attendance and meaningful engagement in class activities.

30% Music Preparation – Students must complete a read-through of their music by week 7 and have it fully memorized by week 10.

10% Performance Quality & Written Assignments – Assessment of performance execution, which may include written analyses or reflections.

30% Final Performance Evaluation – A comprehensive assessment based on the final performance presentation.

Portfolios: A professional portfolio is required, which includes creating a personal website with available media.

#### Final Projects:

All students will participate in a performance, demonstrating their work in a fully staged or semi-staged setting. Formal concert attire is required. Students with alternative performance or research-based assignments will present their projects during the final week of class.

#### Code of Academic Integrity

## Policy on Make-up Tests, Late work, and Incompletes

Assignments must be finalized in accordance with the syllabus deadlines, and no makeup assignments will be offered. Late submissions will not receive a grade higher than a B (86%) and will not be accepted if they are more than one class period overdue. Tests and examinations must be completed on the scheduled date. Exceptional circumstances involving documented illness or emergencies are the only cases where students may be considered for makeup assignments and tests.

#### Structure:

In the professional opera industry, weekly schedules are provided but often shift due to rehearsal adjustments. While we strive to maintain an accurate weekly schedule, flexibility is essential. Classes may include physical warm-ups, theoretical instruction, and performance-based activities. Please wear attire that allows for unrestricted movement.

#### **Additional Expectations:**

Food & Drink: Eating is not allowed in the classroom; water is permitted.

**Punctuality:** Arrive on time and stay for the entire class out of respect for fellow students and faculty. **Lifting Restrictions:** Do not lift objects over 50 lbs. without prior approval. Always bend at the knees when lifting

**Set Construction:** Do not engage in set construction without instructor consent.

**Vocal Health:** If experiencing vocal fatigue, refrain from singing for the rest of the day and mark accordingly. Persistent vocal issues should be addressed by a laryngologist or other qualified medical professional.

**Safety:** If an activity feels unsafe, stop immediately and inform the instructor.

Volume Control: Maintain an appropriate volume during performances and listening sessions.

Repetitive Motion: Avoid excessive repetitive motion whenever possible.

## Policy on the Recording of Lectures

Students enrolled in this course may record video or audio of class lectures for their own personal educational use. A class lecture is defined as a formal or methodical oral presentation as part of a university course intended to present information or teach students about a particular subject. Recording class activities other than class lectures, including but not limited to student presentations (whether individually or as part of a group), class discussion (except when incidental to and incorporated within a class lecture), labs, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving student participation, test or examination administrations, field trips, and private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the lecturer, is prohibited.
