## **Course Description**

This course provides a foundation in practical approaches to effective musical practice and artistry in performance. Special emphasis is placed on how daily practice habits are shaped by cognitive and motor learning principles, memory formation, and performance psychology. - 1. **Understand** key scientific principles behind how musicians learn and retain skills, including concepts from cognitive science, motor learning, and performance psychology.
- 2. **Apply** research-based strategies to structure effective and efficient daily practice sessions.
- 3. Analyze their own practice habits to identify strengths, inefficiencies, and areas for improvement.
- 4. **Develop** personalized practice plans that promote long-term skill development, artistic growth, and expressive performance.
- 5. **Manage** performance anxiety and enhance focus, motivation, and mental resilience using insights from psychology and neuroscience.
- 6. **Communicate** more clearly about their learning process, both in verbal reflections and in collaborative musical settings.
