Grade Appeal Process

Policy on Make-up Tests, Late work, and Incompletes

- 1. Exams will be given only at the scheduled times and places, unless previous arrangements have been made no less than one (1) full week in advance. No one is exempt from exams.

Note: Incomplete grades are only reserved for those students who were passing but could not complete the required work due to exceptional circumstances.
