## **Course Description**

- Encourage a clearer understanding of the skills and customary expectations of the performing arts and the requirements of working in professional theatre.
- Develop basic documentation required for auditioning and applying for jobs involved in the performing arts.
- Develop an understanding of the protocols and customary expectations of the culture of FAU and the department of Theatre and Dance

#### **Course Evaluation Method**

Attendance at each weekly meeting is expected. Since course material will be live presentations of material, interactive discussions of expectations, and guest artist speakers, attendance is

mandatory. Missing two or more weekly meetings will result in an unsatisfactory grade being administered.
