<p><b>Please explain the requested change(s) and offer rationale below or on an attachment.</b></p> <p>1) Remove ANT 3212 H Peoples Around the World from required courses for both the concentration and the minor.          Rationale: ANT 3212 is no longer in the general education requirements, and therefore cannot be taught as frequently as necessary to require for concentration or minor. In the future, this course will be taught approximately every 4 years, allowing it to serve as an elective/area studies course for Anthropology and related concentrations.</p> <p>2) Add an additional required elective for both the concentration and the minor. The total number of required elective courses will increase from three to four for the concentration, and from one to two for the minor.          Rationale: This is to accommodate the change in required credits when removing ANT 3212.</p> <p>3) Remove approved equivalents to ANT 4495 (ANT 4824, ANT 5183 &amp; ANT 4192) in the concentration.          Rationale: These equivalents were added before biological anthropology was an available concentration to allow for variation. Now that students have the biological anthropology concentration option they have other choices if they are interested in studying biological methods. Having one approved methods course will help keep enrollment levels predictable and stable. The archaeological methods have been added to the approved electives.</p> <p>4) Add area studies and electives missing from current list. Add ANT 2100C, ANT 2240, ANT 3212, ANT 4116, and ANT 4824 to electives list, ANT 3212 to area studies.          Rationale: Make sure that all current anthropology classes are included in the list of electives/ area studies so that the concentration options are up to date.</p> <p><small>*All new programs and changes to existing programs must be accompanied by a catalog entry showing the new or proposed changes.</small></p>

# CONCENTRATION IN ANTHROPOLOGY

Students must earn a "C" or better in each course taken to fulfill a concentration requirement.

## PROGRAM OVERVIEW:

The concentration in anthropology provides students with a better understanding of the human condition. Anthropologists view humans holistically-biologically, socially, and culturally. The emphasis of this program is on cultural anthropology. The study of anthropology is beneficial to students who consider careers in medicine, law, international relations, social work, education, health, gerontology, the arts, and numerous other careers. The concentration is designed to provide students with the theoretical background and critical thinking skills necessary for graduate study in anthropology and would be beneficial as a supplement to students in other social sciences. Anthropology can be combined with many other concentrations including environmental studies, biology, political science, psychology, philosophy, women's studies, international studies, area studies, fine arts, literature and history. It can be combined as a double concentration or as part of a planned interdisciplinary studies concentration, or as a minor concentration. This concentration is designed to leave room for students to take enough courses in another discipline according to the program they plan. Students who plan a double concentration or an interdisciplinary concentration should have one advisor from anthropology and one from the other concentration.

**Thesis Writing:** Students may begin the thesis in anthropology (IDS 4970) after successful completion of the course Honors Research Methods, and Honors Theory in Anthropology. Students will select a thesis committee of at least two faculty; the primary thesis advisor must be an anthropology faculty member.

## MINOR CONCENTRATION IN ANTHROPOLOGY

At least 50% of upper-level credits must be from Honors College courses. Students must maintain a 2.0 GPA in coursework that counts for the minor.
