Course Description

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

Objective:

This course utilizes methods and materials used in teaching brass and/or woodwind instruments on the elementary and secondary school level. Objectives are directed toward developing expertise through competencies that will contribute to becoming a more effective instrumental music teacher. This course is an organized practice forum for students on secondary instruments for which participation is the only requirement and is to be taken concurrently with either the Brass and/or Woodwind methods courses. This course may be taken more than once.

Learning Outcomes:

1. Demonstrate implementation of effective pedagogical techniques for beginning brass and/or woodwind instrument instruction.
2. Develop and refine skills in structuring successful learning experiences by delivering succinct instruction and providing appropriate feedback.
3. Demonstrate rehearsal techniques, basic acoustical principles, intonation tendencies, proper breathing techniques, and proper instrument care and maintenance.

Course Evaluation Method

This course uses S/U as a final grade and will be based on class participation as well as the timely completion of all assignments and course requirements. It is expected that each student completes all assignments with competence and accuracy. A grade of "S" is required to pass this class.

1. Class Participation & Professionalism: Actively participate in class by playing during every class, contributing interesting ideas, and posing thoughtful questions. Being punctual, being

prepared, participating in class, turning assignments in on time, etc. all reflect a student's professional demeanor in class. Failure to conduct yourself in a professional manner will impact this grade.

2. Rehearsal Project: Plan, teach, and rehearse 1 piece of music.
3. Midterm Exam: Demonstrate competency on Midterm exam.
4. Final Exam: Demonstrate competency on a final exam.
