COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course explores foundations and practical applications of play-based learning for young children (birth-8 years). An in-depth examination of theories of play, play-based learning environments, and strategies for facilitating both child-initiated and teacher-supported play will be emphasized.

COURSE ASSESSMENTS:

1. Midterm and Final Exams. 30 points or 15% each = 60 points, 30% of the course grade. These exams will cover assigned readings and classroom lectures. (CLO 1,2,3,4,6,7).

2. Individual and group assignments and discussions. 40 points or 20% of the course grade. Complete weekly assignments (individual, group, or discussion) related to play-based curriculum development appropriate for young children (CLO 1,2,3,4,6,7).

3. Play Activities. Design ten play activities based on theories of play. 40 points or 20% of the course grade.

A. Select *at least two* of these theories of play: Erikson’s Psychosocial Development Theory, B. Froebel’s Play Theory, Piaget’s Cognitive Development Theory, or Vygotsky’s Sociocultural Theory. (CLO 1,2,3, OURI SLO 1,2,3).

C. Conduct library research to determine credible sources to create an annotated bibliography of credible sources to support the play-based activities. You are to obtain *at least two articles* that describe *each of the theories* selected. Provide an integrated summary of each theory’s premise as well as important conceptual, operational, sequential, and other important considerations and perspectives of the theory. A minimum of two integrated summaries is required, commensurate with at least two selections of theories. Be sure to include the APA references for the articles and cite the sources, as appropriate, within the summary narratives. **Note: This is a Research skill-building assignment, meeting OURI SLOs 1,2,3.**

D. Design ten play activities, grounded within the selected theories, for children in three age

groups: (a) three play activities for *infants and/or toddlers*, (b) three play activities for *preschool-aged children* (3-4 year-olds), and four play activities appropriate for children in primary grades, *K-3 or 5-8 years in age*, for a total of 10 play-based activities. Be sure to identify the theorists, theories, and the specific aspects of their theories used as the basis for developing the play activities. Utilize the articles selected for Part B of this assignment to support your narrative description of the activities.

4. Compare and contrast the play of a child without special needs AND a child with special needs. 100 points or 30% of the course grade. Students are to obtain permission to observe the play activities and behaviors of two children of similar ages (e.g., 3-4 years, 5-6 years, or 7-8 years old), one child must be typically developing, the other atypically developing (i.e., has a disability or special needs). The children do not need to be in the same setting or school, nor do they need to be playing with each other. (CLO 4,6,7)

Observe the children individually or independently of each other, that is, *not at the same time*. Observe each child for at least three hours, over the course of at least two days, during unstructured routines. This might include center or outdoor times when free play takes place. Use running record documentation as the method of collecting information/data on the children’s play.

Following the completion of observations and running record documentation of both children, write a seven to nine-page paper (single-spaced) describing and interpreting:

- (a) Play of the child without special needs (2.5-3 pages, single-spaced) utilizing play theories discussed in class as a lens for interpreting the child’s play, interactions, and use of toys or materials;
- (b) Play of the child with special needs (2.5-3 pages, single-spaced) utilizing play theories discussed in class a lens for interpreting the child’s play, interactions, and use of toys or materials; and,
- (c) Individualized play-based curriculum *recommendations* for each child to support their learning and play engagements within their individual Zone of Proximal Development (ZPD) (2-3 pages, single-spaced).

COURSE POLICIES

UNIVERSITY POLICIES

AI USE IN CLASS POLICY. FAU recognizes the value of generative AI in facilitating learning. However, output generated by artificial intelligence (AI), such as written words, computations, code, artwork, images, music, etc., for example, is drawn from previously published materials and is not your own original work. FAU students are not permitted to use AI for any course work unless explicitly allowed to do so by the instructor of the class for a specific assignment. Class policies related to AI use are decided by the individual faculty. Some faculty may permit the use of AI in some assignments but not others, and some faculty may prohibit the use of AI in their course entirely. In the case that an instructor permits the use of AI for some assignments, the assignment instructions will indicate when and how the use of AI is permitted in that specific assignment. It is the student's responsibility to comply with the instructor's expectations for each assignment in each course. When AI is authorized, the student is also responsible and accountable for the content of the work. AI may generate inaccurate, false, or exaggerated information. Users should approach any generated content with skepticism and review any information generated by AI before using the generated content as-is. If you are unclear about whether the use of AI is permitted, ask your instructor before starting the assignment. Failure to comply with the requirements related to the use of AI may constitute a violation of the Florida Atlantic Code of Academic Integrity, Regulation 4.001.

PLAGIARISM, CHEATING, AND ACADEMIC HONESTY: Students at Florida Atlantic University are expected to maintain the highest ethical standards. Academic dishonesty, including cheating and plagiarism, is considered a serious breach of these ethical standards, because it interferes with the University mission to provide a high-quality education in which no student enjoys an unfair advantage over any other. Academic dishonesty is also destructive of the University community, which is grounded in a system of mutual trust and places high value on personal integrity and individual responsibility. Harsh penalties are associated with academic dishonesty, which include an “F” on the assignment, an “F” in the course, or even removal from the degree program. The penalty for plagiarism and cheating is determined by the instructor in this class.

Florida Atlantic University Regulation 4.001, “Honor Code, Academic Irregularities, and Student’s Academic Grievances” is strictly adhered to in this course. The regulation states:

(1) Academic irregularities frustrate the efforts of the faculty and serious students to meet University goals. In the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA, 2009), plagiarism is defined as:

Plagiarism (Principle 6.22). Psychologists do not claim the words and ideas of

another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotation marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you will need to credit the source in the text.

RECORDING OF LECTURES: Students enrolled in this course may record video or audio of class lectures for their own personal educational use. A class lecture is defined as a formal or methodical oral presentation as part of a university course intended to present information or teach students about a particular subject. Recording class activities other than class lectures, including but not limited to student presentations (whether individually or as part of a group), class discussion (except when incidental to and incorporated within a class lecture), labs, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving student participation, test or examination administrations, field trips, and private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the lecturer, is prohibited. Recordings may not be used as a substitute for class participation or class attendance and may not be published or shared without the written consent of the faculty member.
