Course may include writers of the U.S. South from pre-Civil War plantation cultures (and their hemispherical reach) through the Southern Literary Renaissance, Grit Lit and the contemporary, such as Douglass, Poe, Cable, Murfree, Caldwell, Hurston, Faulkner, O'Connor, Welty, Williams, Crews, Allison, Vernon, Howe and Tretheway.

Course Objectives

A region of vexed borders, the United States South continues to be the site of violent contestation of history and identity. In fact, understanding the region and its political and cultural dynamics is crucial to understanding the nation itself, for the South (or "Souths," as there are many versions that overlap and that are constructed according to various political, cultural, historical, economic, and identity formations) is the site where the country looks to work out its ills and its romances. This course will follow the development of the region via its literature, which offers one of the richest written troves in the world.

Requirements

This course is divided into three sections: Old South, New South, Contemporary South. Each section will conclude with an exam. Each exam will be made up of three

parts: 1) short-answer identification items, 2) long-essay prompts, 3) bonus items. The short-answer and bonus items will require one-two sentences each. The long-answer essays must be five paragraphs. Each exam will be administered online within a window of several days. Each exam will be worth 30% of your overall grade, for a total of 90%. The remaining 10% of the course grade will be based on class participation, which includes presence in the classroom, evidence of preparation for each class session, and meaningful participation in class discussion.
