Course Description

Course may include British literature from World War I to the end of the 20th century, concentrating on the major movements of modernism and postmodernism. Literary works by Lawrence, Woolf, Eliot, Pinter, Lessing and others may be studied in social and historical contexts, such as the women's and working-class movements, race and immigration and the end of empire.

Instructional Method

This course will be a real-time online course, taught from 7:10 - 10:00 pm Wednesday evening on zoom.

Course Objectives

You will be prepared in this course to analyze works of fiction and poetry from a literary critical perspective.

Course Requirements
