COURSE DESCRIPTION

This 3-credit course will examine the structural and behavioral components of justice in America. Topics to be covered include the role of law in society, the history and structure of American courts, and the processes of civil and criminal litigation.

COURSE GOALS

This course will provide an in-depth examination of the judiciary and law in American society. The student will obtain an understanding of the structure and role of the courts, types of law, the process of appointing/electing judges and the political implications, the organization of the American court system, theories of judicial decision making and behavior, the process and content of judicial policy making and the impact of judicial policies and decisions on American society.

Honors statement: This course fits within the honors curriculum as an elective for Law and Society and Political Science concentrations: there will be emphasis on class discussion and supplemental readings appropriate to an honors-level course.

COURSE EVALUATION METHOD

Participation in classroom activities is mandatory. You must read the assigned materials before coming to class and be prepared to discuss the issues.

200 Points 20% of the final grade. Paper on Court Observations

400 Points 40% of the final grade – Exams (Mid Term and Final – each exam is worth 200 points) The examinations will be "open note". The exams will not be cumulative.

POLICY ON ATTENDANCE, MAKE-UP EXAMS, AND LATE WORK

Students are expected to attend all of their scheduled University classes and to satisfy all academic objectives as outlined by the instructor. The effect of absences upon grades is determined by the instructor, and the University reserves the right to deal at any time with individual cases of non-attendance.

The first unexcused absence will result in a 0 for the assignment due that day. Subsequent unexcused absences will result in a 0 for the assignment and a 1/2 letter grade deduction from your final grade. Exceptions are up to the instructor's discretion.

If an emergency exists that occurs on an exam date, prior approval of the instructor to make up the exam must be obtained unless the situation is such that communication is impossible.

Students MUST complete the February 2 assignment as it is in lieu of class. Failure to complete the assignment will result in a ½ letter grade deduction from your final grade. Exceptions are up to the instructor's discretion.
