The course introduces students to the main principals of American Criminal Law. The course examines the basic concepts of criminal law, and the essential elements of a crime.



Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Recall basic concepts of Criminal Law.
2. Know essential elements of a crime.
3. Describe the law governing the use of force.
4. Know legal defenses for criminal acts.
5. Explain the different forms of punishment for violating the criminal law
6. Understand crimes against persons including homicide, and sexual battery.
7. Know crimes against property including theft, robbery, and burglary.
8. Explain White collar crime, Cybercafe and Commercial crime.

Course Evaluation Method

Grading Criteria: Your grade will be based on the below grading criteria.

Student Introduction and Syllabus & Course Agreement: Not graded.

You will post an introduction in the student introduction discussion board (and reply to at least two others' posts) and complete a syllabus and course agreement.

Discussion Boards (total 20%)

Students are expected to participate in all online discussions. Questions or topics will be posted AS NOTED ON THE SYLLABUS. The discussion boards are designed to explore the contents of the class and develop your collaborative skills. Discussions are graded upon content quality and frequency. You are required to post at least two separate responses during each graded thread (Mon.-Sun.). One of your posts should include your discussion response followed by one comment to other students' posts. Discussions will close each week on Sunday at 11:59 PM EST. /the quality of your post should be "high quality". Please refer to the below to see discussion quality measurements:

1. High Quality Post: Your contribution to each topic indicates your mastery of the materials assigned. Your responses might integrate multiple views and/ or provide value for other participant's responses to your thread. You provide evidence that you are reading the assigned materials and other students' posts and are responding accordingly. You know the facts and are able to analyze them and handle conceptual ideas while providing your own interesting interpretations.

Examples:

1. Continuing discussions by adding additional information
2. Elaborating on previous comments from others
3. Presenting explanations of concepts or methods to help a fellow student
4. Presenting reasons for or against a topic in pervasive fashion
5. Sharing personal experiences that relate to the topic
6. Include proper citations and references that provided support for your post

2. Medium Quality Post: You have meaningful interaction with other students' posts. Your post demonstrates some confidence and states "I agree" or "I disagree" and includes a thorough explanation as to why. You introduce an argument that adds to the discussion; however, your post lacks a bit of structure and rambles rather than making a clear and comprehensive argument. Your post wasn't proof read and lacks proper grammar and punctuation.
3. Low Quality Post: You make trivial comments without adding any new thought to the discussion. You simply agree or disagree but do not add further content to the discussion.

DISCUSSION RULES:

1. Expression of individual opinions and free discussion is encouraged in this class.
2. This demands tolerance on your part for those opinions which you disagree.
3. Tolerance of opinions does not mean acceptance of prejudicial or demeaning remarks. Personally demeaning remarks or inappropriate remarks will not be tolerated.

This includes remarks that are racially and /or sexually offensive.

1. Students who post inappropriate comments will be dealt with individually. If the behavior continues the student will be blocked from posting and will meet with the instructor and the division director to show cause why they should not be expelled from the course.
2. INITIAL POST: Your initial post is due by Thursday @ 11:59 PM of the week that it's due. Late posts will be penalized as follows and are in addition to any other deductions:

Friday – 10%reduction

Saturday – 15% reduction

Sunday – 20% reduction

Course Essay (total 20%)

One 5 page paper will be based on the material presented in class including scientific studies case law and federal and state statutes. Outside web sites, and material may be used.

Course Examinations (total 60%)

Three examinations will be based on readings, lectures, homework, and class discussions. The exams will include multiple choice, true/false and/or short answer questions. Answers will be evaluated based on content in terms of accuracy of information and ability to analyze the issues. Good answers will demonstrate that you have read and understood the chapters, and actively participated in classroom discussions. Exams will be taken online in the Canvas Learning Management System. Test will be timed. No make-up exams are given.

The instructor will calculate your grade based on the following weighted distribution:

Code of Academic Integrity
