## New Minor Proposal

### Criminal Law (to begin Fall 2026)

#### **Background**

The SCCJ has offered electives entitled Issues in Criminal Law (CCJ 4931) and Judicial Administration and Criminal Courts (CJL 4510) for numerous years. Many students who speak with the SCCJ staff at Explore FAU, Choose FAU, and other recruitment events express interest in pursuing criminal law as part of their potential career paths. As such, the SCCJ is proposing a new Criminal Law minor for undergraduate students. The Criminal Law minor within the SCCJ is designed for students interested in pursuing a future career related to criminal law, particularly for those who desire to prepare for law school. Students with an interest in becoming criminal defense attorneys or prosecutors, paralegals, or who might seek to conduct law-related research will benefit greatly from an understanding of the basics of criminal law. The curriculum for the proposed Criminal Law minor can be found below on pages 4-5 in the section titled “Proposed Catalog Language for Criminal Law Minor.”

#### **Criminal Law Programs at other SUS Universities and Peer Institutions**

Table 1 below displays a course catalog search (“Criminal Law Major,” “Criminal Law Minor”) among institutions with a college, school, or department of criminal justice and/or criminology. As can be seen, while some SUS universities have legal studies majors/minors or pre-law certificates, no SUS universities have Criminal Law as its own unique major or minor. Only one peer institution—East Carolina University—has a minor in Criminal Law and Legal Process. This will set FAU apart from other SUS universities and almost all peer institutions.

**Additional Resources Needed to Offer the Minor**

Minimal additional resources will be required of the university to run this minor, and **no additional funds from outside the College will be needed for this program.** The SCCJ has healthy and robust enrollment numbers and a pool of instructors and adjuncts who are already identified to teach within this minor. The SCCJ already offers Judicial Administration and Criminal Courts (CJL 4510) and Issues in Criminal Law (CCJ 4931), which we will be replacing with Criminal Law (CJL 4410), courses every semester. Criminal Law and the Constitution in Florida (CJL 4214) will be a new elective (paperwork is being submitted alongside, but separately from this proposal) and will be taught by an existing adjunct. This, however, will replace a duplicate section of a different elective course (taught by an adjunct)—making it net neutral to offer.

**Summary**

1. The interest of students has been overwhelming as seen through existing class offerings as well as potential students at recruiting events and student involvement in the FAU Mock

Trial Team.

2. Student enrollment within the existing criminal law-related course offerings is at peak capacity each semester.
3. A criminal law minor is not offered at any SUS universities in Florida and among only one peer institutions.

These facts collectively support the creation of a Criminal Law Minor to meet our students' needs and the growing needs of the criminal justice system. The SCCJ, therefore, seeks the Committee's approval for this new minor proposal.

Moving forward, the SCCJ would be greatly interested in exploring how we can work with interested Colleges to offer classes or perhaps create additional programs that would serve to develop the overall expertise of Florida Atlantic graduates.

### **Proposed Catalog Language for Criminal Law Minor**

A minor in Criminal Law is open to all undergraduate students at Florida Atlantic University. The minor consists of 12 credit hours, of which at least 9 credits must be at the upper-division (3000–4000) level. At least 75 percent of the credits required for the minor must be completed at FAU. Students completing the minor must earn a minimum overall FAU grade point average of 2.0 in the coursework required for the minor. The minor includes nine required credits in Criminal Law and related coursework and three elective credits selected from approved law-related courses. Each course applied toward the minor must be completed with a minimum grade of "C."

Note: The CCJ and CJL courses taken to satisfy the requirements of the Criminal Law Minor cannot also be counted toward the requirements of the criminal justice major or minor.

### **Required Courses (3 courses; 9 credits)**

For the Criminal Law Minor, students must complete all three courses listed below. Each course must be completed with a minimum grade of "C." Courses within the minor have no specific required path or order.

- CJL 4410 – Criminal Law (3 credits)
- CJL 4510 – Judicial Administration and Criminal Courts (3 credits)
- CJL 4214 – Criminal Law and the Constitution in Florida (3 credits)

### **Elective Course (1 course, 3 credits)**

Students must complete one of the following courses. The course must be completed with a minimum grade of "C."

- CCJ 4361 – Death Penalty (3 credits)
- CCJ 4196 – Immigration and the Criminal Justice System (3 credits)
- CCJ 4293 – Drug Courts (3 credits)
- CCJ 4694 – Human Trafficking (3 credits)
- CCJ 4940 – Field Experience (Internship) – Must be related to criminal law (3 credits)
  - E.g., Internship at criminal defense attorney firm, office of public defender, state

attorney office, etc.

- CCJ 4934 – Special Topics (acceptable with approval from the SCCJ Undergraduate Program Coordinator when law-related) (3 credits)

- E.g. Women in the Law, Criminal Procedure
- SOW 4141 – Family Violence (3 credits)
- SOW 4700 – Substance Use Disorders in Social Work (3 credits)
- SYP 3570 – Social Control and Deviance (3 credits)
- SYP 3530 – Adolescence and Delinquency (3 credits)
- POS 4606 – The United States Supreme Court (3 credits)
- POS 4603 – Constitutional Law: Government Power and Its Limits (3 credits)
