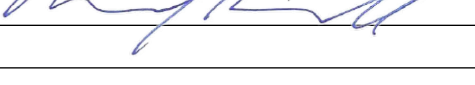

Course Description

Introduces students to basic concepts in the core areas of linguistics (e.g., phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics) using specific examples from the Japanese language. Focus is on systematic aspects of the Japanese language which are unique as well as those which can be compared to other languages. No previous knowledge of the Japanese language or linguistics is necessary.

Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

The goals of the course include learning:

- basic linguistics concepts in phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics
- systematic aspects of the Japanese language
- pragmatic aspects (e.g., politeness and relative social roles) in conversational Japanese

Course Evaluation Method

Midterm

In Week #7 there will be a Midterm which includes all material discussed from Weeks #1 thru #6. There will be a portion for students to apply to the specific language that each student has chosen to study.

Homework:

There will be 7 Homework assignments throughout the semester in which students practice the concepts discussed in the class. The lowest 2 grades will be dropped. Completing these are a good way to help students keep up with the weekly material. These are generally graded for completeness rather than accuracy.

Assignments:

There will be 5 assignments throughout the semester. They may be done collaboratively, but each student must: (i) turn in a separate assignment which s/he wrote/typed up individually, and (ii) list the student(s) that s/he worked with. Please keep a copy of each finished assignment in case the submitted copy is accidentally lost. Any issue about grading must be addressed within 1 week of when the work was graded.

Final Project Presentation:

Students will pick a topic related to Japanese early in the semester and present for 5 minutes (plus Question & Answer period as time provides) on the topic in the final 2 classes (07/22 & 07/24). The presentation will include the preparation of slides. Students will be assessed on the oral component and the slides.

Code of Academic Integrity

Time Commitment Per Credit Hour

Equivalent time and effort are required for Summer Semesters, which usually have a shortened timeframe. Policy on Make-up Tests, Late work, and Incompletes

Apart from the oral portion of the Onsite Report and the Final Project Presentation, all work is due by the last day of the semester (August 1st by 11:59pm). Late work will not be accepted. Make-up grades for the oral portion of the Onsite Report and the Final Project Presentation are not possible if these are missed. In case of illness or other legitimate unforeseen circumstances, participants can submit documentation to submit work past the due date for full credit. Without legitimate documentation, late work will not be accepted.

Policy on the Recording of Lectures

Students enrolled in this course may record video or audio of class lectures for their own personal educational use. A class lecture is defined as a formal or methodical oral presentation as part of a university course intended to present information or teach students about a particular subject.
