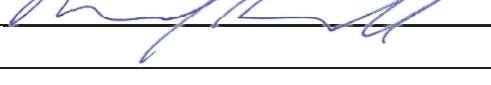

Course Description:

This course focuses on how social problems emerge, how social scientists study social problems, and how social problems are affected by public opinion and government policies. Topics addressed in this course may include social problems related to the economy, poverty, urbanization, crime and deviance, work and the workplace, health and health care, as well as various challenges faced by the elderly, women, and racial/ethnic minorities. While the focus of this course is social problems in the U.S., select issues will be analyzed from a global comparative perspective.

Course Objectives:

After you have taken this course, you will be able to:

1. Describe various social problems, their extent, and human costs.
2. Demonstrate an understanding of how different social problems emerge, continue, and decline.
3. Assess and analyze (through discussion as well as through writing) various problems from a sociological perspective using theories discussed in class.
4. Conduct research regarding selected social problems using library databases and other resources.

Disclaimer

****One of the objectives of this course is to facilitate critical thinking and debate around topics, theories, and concepts where disagreement is not only anticipated, but encouraged. The ability to think critically, express your ideas clearly, and respond to the professor and other students civilly are the keystones of academic experience. In this course, the professor will provide instruction in an objective manner and will remain open to a wide variety of viewpoints, so long as those viewpoints are evidence-based and presented in a respectful way. During class, the professor may take positions and make statements for the sole purpose of accomplishing an academic objective or enhancing the learning environment. Additionally, the adoption of class materials for this course does not imply an endorsement of the full content of those materials or the positions of the authors of those materials. Often the professor will provide materials as a point of departure for critical thinking and debate. Students should keep in mind that the ideas presented or discussed during class may not necessarily reflect the professor's personal beliefs or opinions on the subject matter.****

Instructional Method

This class is designated "Fully online." This means that there are no face-to-face meetings and all course materials, including assignments, recorded lectures, DB questions, paper guidelines, exam study guides, and exams are located on **Canvas**.

Sometimes my lectures will cover material not discussed in the textbook, but you are still responsible for this material.

University Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend all of their scheduled University classes and to satisfy all academic objectives as outlined by the instructor. The effect of absences upon grades is determined by the instructor, and the University reserves the right to deal at any time with individual cases of non-attendance. Students are responsible for arranging to make up work missed because of legitimate class absence, such as illness, family emergencies, military obligation, court-imposed legal obligations, or participation in university-approved activities. Examples of University-approved reasons for absences include participating on an athletic or scholastic team, musical and theatrical performances, and debate activities. It is the student's responsibility to give the instructor notice prior to any anticipated absences and within a reasonable amount of time after an unanticipated absence, ordinarily by the next scheduled class meeting. Instructors must allow each student who is absent for a university-approved reason the opportunity to make up work missed without any reduction in the student's final course grade as a direct result of such absence.

IMPORTANT: The Revel Access Code comes with the electronic version of the textbook, so **the Access Code is really the only thing you need to purchase**. You can purchase the code via the **Access Pearson** hyperlink on Canvas (see directions below).

Evaluation Method:

- 1) **STUDENT INTRODUCTION AND SYLLABUS QUIZ (4% of course grade).** Students will be asked to post a short 2-5 minute long video introduction telling something about themselves (3 things that I like and anything else they want to share with the class) and take a short quiz on the content of the syllabus. **Four percent** of the course grade comes from a short student introduction and the syllabus quiz.
- 2) **EXAMS (51%).** There will be **three** exams in this course, each worth **17 percent** of your final grade. All exams are based on material discussed during online lectures, as well as the videos and readings from your textbooks and other sources. None of the exams is cumulative.
- 3) **WRITING ASSIGNMENT (12%).** A single writing assignment (4-5 page-long, double space). You will have **a choice** of writing a paper that will be due in the first half of the semester **or** writing a paper on a different topic that will be due in the second half of the semester (the guidelines for both papers are located on Canvas in the “Paper Assignment Guidelines” module. You are welcome to write both papers. If you complete both paper assignments, the paper with the higher grade will count towards the course grade. You must submit the paper assignment through the Assignments link in Canvas on or before the due date. The deadline for paper submission may be extended for students who provide documentation that they were unable to submit the assignment due to extraordinary circumstances (hospitalization, death in the family, etc.). **A 10 points penalty will be applied for each day the submission is past due. Students who submit AI-written work will receive a score of zero and will not be allowed to make it up.**
- 4) **DISCUSSION BOARD. (12%).** As part of the course assignments, you will be asked to post an original submission to the discussion board and reply to at least **two** other students’ posts with a substantive response. There will be five DB this semester to choose from, however, only **Four** DB will count towards your grade. If you complete five DBs, the DB with the lowest grade will be dropped, and if you complete six DBs, the two DB with the lowest grades will be dropped. A substantive post adds value to the discussion by bringing new ideas, research, evidence, etc. to the conversation. You are required to consult at least **one external source** (a newspaper article, a journal article, a documentary, etc.) and list that source at the end of your post as reference in an **ASA format**. Full sentences, proper spelling, **source citations in the body of the post**, etc., are expected. Ensure that postings contain detailed response(s) to the question(s). Avoid unnecessary and/or lengthy quotations; do not plagiarize. The **minimal length** for the original post is **300 words and 100 words** for each response. **Students who submit AI-written work will receive a score of zero and will not be allowed to make it up.** All original posts for each module discussion board must be submitted by 11:59pm, EST, on **Friday**. Responses to peers are due at 11:59pm, EST, on **Sunday**. Late discussion posts will be accepted only under extraordinary circumstances (for example, prolonged and **documented** illness/hospitalization).

- 5) **REVEL QUIZZES. (10%)** Your textbook in this course comes with a software package called **Revel** that contains **sections and chapter quizzes**. You will have approximately one to two weeks to read each chapter assigned for this course and complete the quizzes associated with the chapter. You must complete the reading and the quizzes by the **deadline listed online**. Students who fail to complete any of the chapter quizzes due to extenuating and documented circumstances (hospitalization, death of a family member) will be given extension upon request. The due dates for revel quizzes are listed in **Canvas** (click on **Revel** link to access the **due dates** for each quiz)
- 6) **Research Proposal (8%).** Students will submit a brief 1-2-page (single space) proposal for a future research project that would have the rationale for pursuing the topic (scientific and/or social significance), a research question, two hypotheses with clearly identified independent and dependent variables, a preliminary literature review, and a proposed research method. Students should also include a rationale for using a specific sociological theory in their paper.
- Students whose proposals received low grades (7 or lower out of 10) will be required to submit a **Revised Research Proposal**. If the revised proposal's grade is higher than the grade for the original proposal, that grade will replace the grade of the original proposal.
- Detail guidelines of how to write a research proposal will be posted on Canvas.
- 7) **FREEBIE. (3%)** You will be automatically awarded **3 percent** of your grade for taking the course. You do not need to do anything to receive the "Freebie."

Missed Exams

If you know you must miss a test, you may take the exam at a pre-arranged time. Any student who fails to complete an exam will receive a grade of zero. Make-up exams are only given for **valid reasons** (documentation is required). Make-up exams must be taken within one week after the scheduled exam date (some exceptions may apply). Students who missed an exam will still be able to take a make-up exam, however, **20 points penalty** will be applied to the exam score.

Policy on Makeup Tests, Late Work, and Incompletes (if applicable)

Make up assignments (tests, quizzes, discussion board posts, papers) are allowed only for students who miss the deadline for any of these assignments due to valid reasons (hospitalization, university sponsored events, death in the family, etc.). Students must provide documentation to be allowed to make up an assignment. Students will not be penalized for absences due to participation in university-approved activities, including athletic or scholastics teams, musical and theatrical performances, and debate activities. Instructors will allow these students to make up missed work without any reduction in the student's final course grade. Reasonable accommodation will be made for students participating in religious observance. Grades of Incomplete ("I") are reserved for students who are passing a course but have not completed all the required work because of exceptional circumstances.

Classroom Etiquette Policy (if applicable)

Use of electronic equipment by students during lectures is disruptive and distracting to other students. Therefore, the use of cell phones, laptops, tablets, and other electronic devices during lectures is strictly prohibited. If a student must make a phone call, the student must leave the classroom quietly. Use of laptops, tablets, and other electronic devices is prohibited except for typing lecture notes. Students registered with the Student Accessibility Services (SAS) may use electronic devices they need in the classroom upon submission of the SAS accommodation form.

Policy on the Recording of Lectures

Because of a new Florida Statute in 2021, the following model language is suggested for inclusion in course syllabi, at the discretion of individual faculty:

Students enrolled in this course may record video or audio of class lectures for their own personal educational use. A class lecture is defined as a formal or methodical oral presentation as part of a university course intended to present information or teach students about a particular subject. Recording class activities other than class lectures, including but not limited to student presentations (whether individually or as part of a group), class discussion (except when incidental to and incorporated within a class lecture), labs, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving student participation, test or examination administrations, field trips, and private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the lecturer, is prohibited. Recordings may not be used as a substitute for class participation or class attendance and may not be published or shared without the written consent of the faculty member. Failure to adhere to these requirements may constitute a violation of the University's Student Code of Conduct and/or the Code of Academic Integrity.

Late Work Policy:

Some scheduled activity (in a category formally recognized by the University) may be a reason why you should be permitted to make up any work that you missed. This includes activities like jury duty, University-sponsored activities (athletics, Model UN, etc.), or religious observations. You know about this kind of activity in advance, so you must contact me in advance to ask for extensions on deadlines. You will need to document the activity, except for religious observance. You also will need to explain why you can't do the activity earlier or later in the week. You may also qualify for an extension of a deadline if some unexpected event makes it impossible for you to meet the deadline. The most common such event is a serious illness; the next most common is a death in the family or in your friendship group. (Please keep in mind that I may request documentation for any request for late submission of work without penalty.)
