COURSE DESCRIPTION

As one of the largest economic sectors housing plays critical roles in maintaining the stability and health of local communities. It is also the important element of our daily lives as basic shelters. For most it is often the largest expense in the household. For some others housing is an investment commodity and asset due to the immobility and scarce nature of land. Housing price change is oftentimes a proxy of the economic cycles. There have been many issues in the U.S. housing market, remarkably the recent foreclose crisis and the shortage of affordable housing in many metropolitan areas. This course introduces these issues and how the public and private sectors respond to correcting them. The focus of the course is to assess the current housing needs and housing problems, and prescribe policy alternatives to address these needs and problems. The course is in a seminar format where active learning is expected. The course will cover the following topics:

- > Fundamentals of housing research methods
- ➤ Assessment of housing needs and housing problems
- Supply side of the U.S. housing policy
- ➤ Demand side of the U.S. housing policy
- Implementation, impact and evaluation of housing policies

COURSE OBJECTIVE

The course objective will meet the criteria indicated by PAB (Planning Accreditation Board). At the end of the semester students are expected to be able to

- Understand the important role that housing policy plays in shaping the residential landscape of the United States.
- ➤ Appreciate the housing planning process in local communities.
- ➤ Pinpoint the housing problems in a housing market.
- Assess the affordable housing needs of local communities.
- Grasp the basic research methods of housing.

- ➤ Calculate basic financial figures related to housing finance and taxes.
- Understand the different participants in establishing and implementing housing and community development policies.

The course is organized into bi-weekly units with dates provided for each unit. The course begins with a START HERE unit that will familiarize you with the organization and navigation of the course. Every other week you will open a new unit to access the reading materials, PowerPoints, and other materials relevant to the two weeks' topic, your assignments for each unit will be listed within the unit.

To be successful in this course you should be familiar with and be able to execute the following technological skills:

- Taking a test through Canvas

- Copy and paste functions
- Microsoft Office tools: Word, PowerPoint, Excel
- Searching the FAU library and websites

EVALUATION AND GRADING

In addition to online participation and chapter quizzes each student is expected to complete a midterm essay/report and a final essay/report. The assignments should strictly follow the guidelines posted on Canvas. All assignments must be electronically submitted to the designated sections on Canvas. Detailed instructions of these assignments will be posted under each study unit. Online learning mostly relies on your self-discipline. Depending on the pace of your study, please allocate at least four (4) hours each week (thus eight hours bi-weekly) to complete all the assignments. Cramming before the due dates may result in excessive stress or even failure in this course.

- Bi-Weekly Discussion Board Posting (4 units with multiple entries for each unit, 20% Total)
- Chapter Quizzes (6 units; each unit may have one quiz or multiple small quizzes, 50% Total)
- Midterm Paper: Review of Local Affordable Housing Policy, Tools, and Implementation (15%)
 - In this assignment students should conduct a literature review of affordable housing policy and then focus on a mid- to large sized municipality and explore how the municipality provides affordable housing (including low income housing and public housing). Describe

basic land use, zoning and other policies for affordable or low income housing provision at different levels (municipal, county, and state). Enumerate public and private organizations working on providing affordable and low income housing in this municipality. Explain how these organizations work and their major funding sources. Assess the impact of the municipality's major affordable housing and low income housing projects. Tabulate and map the housing voucher holders. Evaluate local policies and organizational efforts in providing affordable and low income housing.

• Final Paper: Local Housing Needs Assessment (15%)

In this exercise students should conduct a literature review describing basic methods of housing needs assessment, then focus on a small municipality (population less than 50,000, but students can choose a city with any population size) in the U.S. and conduct a basic housing needs assessment for residents with different income levels.

NOTE: No late assignments are accepted, except with special permission from the instructor.

Grading Structure:

$$A = 94-100 (4.00); A = 90-93 (3.67)$$

An "A" signifies an <u>exceptional</u> clear and creative grasp of the concepts of the course with demonstrated ability to apply this knowledge to specific problem situations. It also means that the student has actively participated in class activities and has completed all material in a neat and timely manner. The material indicates that the student spent extra time, personal energy, and critical reflection in an effort to demonstrate exceptional work.

A "B" signifies a <u>solid</u> understanding of the major concepts of the course and the ability to apply those concepts. It also means that the student's effort and class participation have exceeded the minimal basic requirements for the course. All assignments were judged to be <u>solid</u> in content and were completed in a timely manner.

A "C" signifies a <u>satisfactory</u> understanding and application of the concepts of the course as well as minimal participation in class activities. It also indicates that the student completed the appropriate assignments that <u>satisfied the basic course</u> requirements.

A "D" signifies a <u>below average</u> demonstration and application of the concepts of the course and/or inadequate preparation in class activities. It may also indicate that <u>assignments were not</u> completed in a satisfactory or timely manner.

F = less than 60 (0.00) (undergraduate students)

F = less than 70 (0.00) (graduate students)

An "F" signifies that the student has <u>not demonstrated</u> adequate understanding or application of the course material. It may also indicate that the student has <u>not</u> met the attendance or assignment requirements.

NETIQUETTE POLICY
