LAW IN THE REAL WORLD

(IDS 3187 Honors College)

Wilkes Honors College, Spring 2016 1 credit course. No prerequisites

Instructor: Lawrence Buck (Palm Beach County Bar Association – North County Section)

Description: This is a one credit graded course designed to help students understand how various laws will affect them in real life applications. No prior knowledge of the law is assumed and the course is designed for students with varying academic interests including the sciences, social sciences, business, and humanities. A multitude of law topics will be discussed and summarized to emphasize how the law applies to a wide range of disciplines. For example, all sessions will be of relevance to students exploring political science; sessions on intellectual property law will be of relevance to students in the sciences and artistic fields; sessions on family, criminal and juvenile law will be of relevance to students in the psychology and sociology fields; sessions on business, consumer and bankruptcy law will be of relevance to students concentrating in business related fields; immigration will be of relevance to students concentrating in international studies. **Catalog description**: Introduction to how the law impacts individuals' personal and professional lives and applies to a wide range of disciplines.

Statement of honors distinction: This course differs substantially from a non-Honors course. The expectations for participation in class discussions will be greater than in a typical undergraduate course with a larger cap. Most importantly, this course will reflect the interdisciplinary nature of Honors education and will inculcate critical attitudes and skills that will teach you how to learn for yourself.

Goal: An objective of the class is to provide students with a basic understanding of certain laws that will affect their personal and professional lives. Another objective of the class is to illustrate the importance of interdisciplinary in confronting real world issues. The class will be taught by practicing attorneys who each specialize in the particular area of the law they will speak upon.

Requirements: Reading materials supplied, no independent textbook required. Final exam is open book. It is recommended that the student collect and organize all reading materials presented during class for use in the final exam.
