**Course Description:** This online survey course brings into focus the roots and historical perspective of Jazz in American society. Musical and historical events and their effect on the development and evolution of jazz music from its inception through the present day are explored.

Course Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course students will:

- Define basic musical terms as found in discussion, readings, and media excerpts.
- List, in chronological order, the prominent eras/styles of Jazz music.
- Define, by citing specific characteristics, the prominent eras of Jazz music.
- Name the most important artists from each of the prominent eras of Jazz music.
- Identify by listening the most important artists from each of the prominent eras of Jazz music.
- Explain the major relationships between Jazz music and the historical, social and economic factors of each era.
- Create an original Wiki for one major artist/group in Jazz to demonstrate a thorough knowledge of that artist's/group's contribution to both the musical genre and American society through their music.

#### **Required Materials:**

- If you purchase the textbook new, then it will include a subscription to *Rhapsody*. A subscription to this service is REQUIRED and you will not be able to complete and/or pass this class without it! If you decide to purchase the textbook used, then you must, on your own, purchase a subscription to *Rhapsody* via the following website: <a href="https://www.rhapsody.com">www.rhapsody.com</a>. There will be listening examples presented in each module and questions on each exam pertaining to what you have listened to.
- You must also purchase specific episodes of a DVD series entitled *Jazz* by Ken Burns (Details on which episodes to purchase can be found in each Unit). It is available for purchase on iTunes or you can purchase the entire set at <a href="https://www.amazon.com">www.amazon.com</a> either new or used.

#### **Course Requirements:**

- You must have access to FAU's blackboard site in order to complete this course. In addition, research on specific topics
  will be required at the University library either in person or through web access.
- In order to be successful in this class, you must possess the following technological skills/materials:
  - Access to a reliable computer, including an audio card and speakers or headphones which will enable playback of the required listening examples presented during this course.
  - Access to a reliable internet connection.
  - Ability to navigate Blackboard.
  - O Ability to play the required DVDs for this course.



#### **Communication Policies:**

- TIME COMMITMENT: Students often misjudge the amount of time necessary for successful completion of an online course. It is recommended that you commit at least five hours per week to this course: three hours of material that will be delivered and approximately two hours towards completing all course requirements. If you engage yourself in this subject it should be fun and rewarding. However, if you intend to put this class at the bottom of your priority list and not take it seriously, you will probably have trouble with it. I am a firm believer in self responsibility: you do not deserve a grade in this class, you earn it. Do not assume that just because this class can be fun and interesting means that it will be easy.
- ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: Deadlines for tests and other events are set within the course to which students must adhere. Failure to meet these obligations may be viewed as course abandonment, and a failing grade will be assigned. If you are experiencing major illnesses, absences due to university activities, or other large- scale issues, contact the instructor immediately to formulate a resolution (if possible). Notifying your instructor after the fact will not be sufficient to warrant a resolution unless there was no other option.
- ANNOUNCEMENTS: You are responsible for reading all announcements posted by the instructor. Check the announcements each time you login to be sure you have read all of them since your last login session.
- COURSE-RELATED QUESTIONS: Post course-related questions to the General Questions/Concerns discussion board. Asking course-related questions in this way allows other participants with the same question to benefit from the responses. Also, make sure you review this forum prior to posting a question; it may have already been asked and answered in previous posts. Except Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, questions will be generally answered by the instructor within 48 hours.
- EMAIL POLICY: **Messages in Blackboard** is the preferred method to contact your instructor. Except for Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, instructors will respond to messages generally within 24 hours. Such messages should only be used to communicate personal or confidential matters; otherwise, please use the General Questions/Concerns discussion board within the course
- NETIQUETTE: Due to the casual communication common in the online environment, participants are sometimes
  tempted to relax their grammar, spelling, and/or professionalism; however, remember you should always present yourself
  professionally—your communication should be appropriate. Also, please note that in the online environment you do not
  have the advantage of voice inflection or gestures. As a result, sarcasm can come across very negative, so this form of
  communication should be avoided.

### **Grading Methods**: Students will be graded by the following:

- EXAMS (80 points each): There are four exams scheduled during the course of the semester which will be administered through blackboard. You must take the four exams in order to pass this class and no make-ups will be given! Not doing so will result in a failing grade. Exams will contain a combination of multiple-choice, matching, fill in the blank, true/false and listening questions. Spelling and grammar do count and no corrections will be made due to those types of errors. Each exam will cover material presented in each unit and will not be cumulative. Unit exams will be available from Thursday at 8am to Friday at 5pm of the assigned week. The exams will not be timed however they must be completed by the due date. All pertinent dates can be found on the course schedule below.
- QUIZZES (20 points each): At the conclusion of each module (excluding the first week of classes and when there is an exam scheduled), there will be a quiz. Each quiz will contain ten questions and you will have thirty minutes to finish. There will be no make-ups for quizzes however the lowest quiz grade will be dropped for a total of nine quizzes graded. Module quizzes will be available from Thursday at 8am to Friday at 5pm of the assigned week. All pertinent dates can be found on the course schedule below.
- DISCUSSION BOARD POSTS (4 posts, 40 points each):
  - O There will be a Discussion Board Assignment during the last module of each unit. These discussions are graded discussions. Your posts must be professional, well organized, grammatically correct, and free of misspellings. Additionally, any content quoted, paraphrased, or gleaned from references must be properly cited (see Plagiarism



and APA)\*. This policy includes references to work from your co-learners. Interaction is a substantial portion of your grade.

- o Each Discussion Board Assignment will be available Saturday at 8am. (Check the course schedule)
- o For each Discussion Board Assignment you will be required to make a minimum of 3 posts to receive full credit:
  - One original post in response to the instructor's post (100-200 words in length)
     DUE: Tuesday at 11:59pm of the assigned week
  - Two responses (50-100 words in length) to co-learners posts. **DUE: Friday at 5pm of the assigned week**
- The responses must contribute to the conversation through supportive addition or critique. When the responses are of the latter, they must argue the issue, never the author.
- o The posts should be entered directly into the discussions, not in the form of an attachment. Attachments should be held to a minimum and only if needed for illustration, e.g., chart, image, or table.
- o Follow up responses can be posted until the discussion board closes.
- O A Rubric will be used to grade the discussion board posts and it can be viewed in the grade book prior to submission of the required posts. All pertinent dates can be found on the course schedule below.
- WIKI PROJECT (150 points): As a final project, each student as part of a group, will create an original Wiki page on one major artist/group in Jazz to demonstrate thorough knowledge of that particular artist's/group's contribution to both the musical genre and American society through music.
- All information should be accurate, professional, well organized, grammatically correct, and free of misspellings.
  - Additionally, any content quoted, paraphrased, or gleaned from references must be properly cited (see Plagiarism and APA). \*\*APA, Turabian, or MLA are acceptable methods of citation. However, the use of such methods must be correct.
  - Beginning the second week of classes, you will be assigned a group in order to complete this project. There will be on average four students per group. It is up to your group to decide via your groups' discussion board, chat or messages the topic of your particular Wiki. Each student is expected to complete an equal amount of work on the project.
  - A Rubric will be used to grade the Wiki and it can be viewed in the grade book prior to submission of the required project.
  - o The final project is due the thirteenth week of classes.
  - O You must submit your section of the project INDIVIDUALLY. Do not let one member of the group submit the project for all members! If this happens, those who have no measurable participation in Blackboard will receive a zero for the project!!

**Makeups:** Makeup exams will be possible only to those students who have either petitioned me in advance of the exam date by email with a valid reason, or have an emergency situation that came up at the last minute. **Students can petition for a makeup** after the exam dates only in the case of an emergency.

- You must petition to take a makeup exam via Blackboard messages that includes the following information:
  - O A detailed explanation of why you cannot take the exam at the regular time. Although I will use my discretion, typically I will allow makeup exams in the cases of school related activities, funerals, and certain family situations. Some of the reasons that are not acceptable include: oversleeping, "I thought the exam was *next* Thursday," "My internet would not work," etc.
- If your petition does not contain the information requested above, it will not be answered. Please make sure that it is presented in a clearly worded, straightforward manner.
- If you know before the exam date that you need to take a makeup, your petition must be sent *before* the scheduled exam date. If an unexpected situation comes up at the last minute that requires you to take a makeup, you must petition within three days after the exam date. Students who do not meet these requirements will not be permitted to take a makeup.
- Makeups must be taken within one week of the exam date.
- You cannot makeup more than one exam.
