The meeting, virtual as well as in-person, was called to order at 10:02 a.m. by UUPC Chair Korey Sorge.

#### I. APPROVAL OF MINUTES AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Chair Sorge welcomed committee members and guests. He then asked whether everyone had read the January 29, 2024, minutes and if there were any corrections and/or additions. There being no changes, the minutes were approved.

#### II. NEW BUSINESS

#### 1. University-Wide

Donna Chamely-Wiik, chair of the Undergraduate Research Curriculum Committee (URCC), outlined the major changes to the document that describes the work of URCC. She began by noting it is the Office of Undergraduate Research and Inquiry's 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year! She shared that a recent review of FAU's research-intensive courses showed some areas of confusion, missing items and other outliers to the URCC policies. The document needed an intensive overview. One of the notable changes is research intensive courses will be reviewed every five years now, not every three years as is currently taking place. Other changes will assist faculty in identifying courses that could become research intensive and how to qualify a course for that designation. The updates also include specific course changes that now require URCC review and approval.

A discussion took place about the new requirement that 40 percent of the grade for a research-intensive course must be tied to RI assignments or projects. Dr. Chamely-Wiik explained that other institutions use 50 percent of the grade as their marker. She said the idea behind placing a specific percentage on the courses is to maintain the integrity of the research-intensive program and ensure students take research intensive courses seriously. She added that the 40 percent is not on one assignment, but on several assignments linked to research items. **The UUPC approved the revisions to the URCC document**.

RO Rep Maria Jennings presented the Annual Inactive Course Review. This annual review is mandated by the state and ensures that FAU's course inventory includes only active, relevant courses. She said that the approval process includes the college departments, the UUPC, Steering and Senate. Once all approvals are gathered, the courses are terminated in the Statewide Course Numbering System (SCNS), Banner and the University Catalog. **The UUPC approved the deletion of inactive courses on this report.** 

Undergraduate Studies Dean Dan Meeroff provided an update on the upcoming General Education changes mandated by the state. The state requires that all General Education course must be aligned with one of five Gen. Ed. distribution areas, which means that FAU's Global Citizenship courses must be

realigned to one of the five areas. The university is working with the colleges and faculty to make these realignments. The changes will be presented at the next UUPC meeting.

## 2. Arts and Letters

## **General Education Courses**

AL Rep Eric Hanne presented the first five courses in the table below, General Education courses for which the course descriptions will be changing according to a state mandate. Approval from the Core Curriculum Committee is included. **The UUPC approved the five course description changes.** 

## Architecture

Guest Heather Ligler spoke about the three ARC courses and their pre- or corequisite changes. She indicated the changes will assist students in completing their programs in a more timely manner. **The UUPC approved those changes.** 

### **Communication and Multimedia Studies**

Guest Chris Robé explained that the five course title changes from Communication and Multimedia Studies help to modernize the courses. The field is constantly changing because of technological advances, and FAU's offerings need to stay current. The program change to the B.A. in Multimedia Studies updates the courses with proposed title changes and other revisions. **The five course title changes and program change were approved by the UUPC.** 

#### Philosophy

Guest Sam Director, Philosophy, discussed materials from his department. He said the B.A. program change is necessary to incorporate the course changes as well as a new course, all noted in the table below. This change also eliminates the Philosophy Law concentration due to low interest among students. The Philosophy minor program change updates the residency credit total and eliminates minor tracks. Four courses are having credits changed from 4 to 3 due to a peer institution review, and a new course was presented. A question was asked about how the reduction of credits in these courses affects the program. Dr. Director replied that total credits for electives are being increased to make up for those changes. **The UUPC approved all the foregoing proposals.** 

## Sociology

Guest Philip Lewin presented two new courses in Sociology. These elective courses will expose students to careers in Sociology. Dr. Lewin was asked if catalog changes are needed to add these courses to the program's elective table. It was noted that Sociology does not explicitly list its electives; therefore, a catalog changes is not necessary. **The UUPC approved the two new courses.** 

#### Visual Arts/Art History

A new combined program, B.A. in Art with Art History and Studio Art concentrations to Master of Nonprofit Management (M.N.M.) was presented by Guest Robin Larson. She said the program, unique in Florida, would be ideal for Art students who decide to work in nonprofit arts organizations or museums and galleries and added that many art students choose careers with nonprofits. **The UUPC approved the program, which was also previously approved by the University Graduate Programs Committee.**

## 4. Business

#### Economics

BA Rep Julia Higgs introduced Guest Long Liu who addressed the two Economics courses on the agenda. He stated that the prerequisites will be changed and all other restrictions removed from both. Rep Higgs asked about some course restrictions that are noted in Banner but not in the catalog. RO Rep Jennings explained that certain course restrictions are added or removed at the section level to allow departments the flexibility to restrict certain sections for a group of students or open up sections to more students if space is available. These restrictions, such as permission of instructor or sophomore standing, are handled through course schedule changes as long as they are not in the catalog. The UUPC approved the changes.

#### Finance

Guest Charles Yang discussed two Risk Management courses. They are to have their prerequisites changed and all restrictions removed making the courses available to a wider group of students. **The UUPC approved the changes.** 

## Information Technology and Operations Management (ITOM)

Guest David Menachof presented the change to QMB 3600 that will have its prerequisites changed to add another calculus course to the list (MAC 2311) that already includes MAC 2233. The department has found that many students take MAC 2311 instead of MAC 2233, both appropriate choices. **The UUPC approved the change.** 

#### International Business

A new combined program pairing a B.B.A. or B.S. with the M.S. in International Business was discussed by Guest Len Trevino. He said there has been much interest in this type of program where students take 150 credits to acquire both a bachelor's degree and a master's degree, double-counting 12 graduate credits to complete both degrees in approximately five years. The UUPC approved the new combined program. It was noted that this program was also previously approved by the University Graduate Programs Committee.

### Health Administration

BA Rep Julia Higgs presented the remainder of the College of Business items, which included six courses with title changes and/or course description changes and a program change in the B.H.S. in Health Administration. **The UUPC approved all the Health Administration items.** 

### Hospitality and Tourism Management

Lastly, two changes for Hospitality and Tourism Management were presented. These involve changing the name of the Meetings and Events Management Certificate to just Events Management and the name of a course with the same title revision. **The UUPC approved the Hospitality and Tourism Management revisions.**

# 5. Engineering and Computer Science

EG Rep Hongbo Su introduced Guest Hari Kalva to discuss the Engineering and Computer Science agenda items. **Two courses with prerequisite changes were approved by the UUPC. The rest of the items were postponed by the UUPC** because four new courses did not have complete syllabi, and this affected the program changes since those four courses were included in those program changes. A fifth course, COP 2220, is changing its content from teaching the C programming language to teaching the Python programming language. It was noted that several majors include this course in their requirements, and they were not consulted about this change. The Committee asked for those letters of support before moving forward with this course. To view the items that were postponed, refer to the <u>UUPC's February 26, 2024 agenda</u>.

## 7. Science

#### **General Education Courses**

Chair Sorge addressed 15 General Education courses, (first courses in the table below) all of which have

changes in their descriptions due to a state mandate. The UUPC approved the description changes for these courses.

### Biology

Guest Randy Brooks discussed two new elective courses. ED Rep Bhagwanji asked about catalog change implications. Dr. Brooks replied there are no catalog changes associated with the new courses since there isn't a comprehensive list of electives in the catalog. **The UUPC approved the new courses.** 

### Geosciences

Guest James Gammack-Clark described all of the items from his department beginning with the termination of GLY 4200C. He said the content of this course has been moved to one of the new courses; therefore, this course is no longer needed. **The UUPC approved the course termination.** 

Four new courses were introduced that are tied to the interests of new faculty members. **The new courses** were approved by the UUPC.

Four course changes, including a course level change and credit increase, were discussed. For the course changing to the 4000 level and increasing credits from 3 to 4 (GLY 3155C), Dr. Gammack-Clark explained the changes are justified because this course now involves seven days of field work a week, which as a 3-credit course does not seem appropriate. AL Rep Hanne asked if the increase in credits will have an adverse effect on timely graduation, and Dr. Gammack-Clark confirmed it will not. **The four course changes were approved by the UUPC.** 

The program changes in Geosciences were necessary to reflect the new courses and course changes previously discussed. These changes also include administrative updates **All program changes were approved by the UUPC.**
