<u>Course Description</u>: An introduction to cultural anthropology. Readings focus on methodology and anthropological approaches to gender, ethnicity, kinship, economics, religion, art, and politics.

This writing intensive course serves as one of two "Gordon Rule" classes at the 2000-4000 level that must be taken. You must achieve a grade of "C" (not C-minus) or better to receive credit. Furthermore, this class meets the University-wide Writing Across the Curriculum (WAC) criteria, which expect you to improve your writing over the course of the term. Writing-to-learn activities have proven effective in developing critical thinking skills, learning discipline-specific content, and understanding and building competence in the modes of inquiry and writing for various disciplines and professions.

### **Course Requirements:**

You are expected to come to class prepared to discuss the readings for the day. Failure to actively participate in class discussions will result in a lower final grade. There will be regular, unannounced quizzes on the readings for the day.

#### Writing Assignments:

Writing assignments promote critical thinking and analytical writing; require students to analyze academic discourse and non-academic reportage; encourage students to recognize and examine the intellectual and/or cultural assumptions that underlie course readings and their own writing.

You will write three short papers and two revisions during the course. The second essay will be peer reviewed. Papers should be submitted in hard copy at the beginning of class. Please do not e-mail papers to me or submit them on disk. The revisions should be submitted along with the original papers. Late papers will be marked down 1/3 of a letter grade for each day late, unless you have a documented medical excuse.

### Description of Paper Assignments and Feedback:

Students are required to write three papers on the course material. The first paper will be a 900 word discussion of anthropological approaches to studying culture, race, ethnicity, nationalism, marriage, gender, or kinship. The second paper will be a 1500 word analysis of Marjorie Shostak's book Nisa, that builds on the first paper. The second paper will be peer-reviewed and revised. Your grade will be based on your own writing and revision as well as your peer-review of another student's paper. The final paper will be a 1500 word critical analysis of globalization, gender, and transnational families based on the final ethnography. Papers will be returned with substantive feedback from the instructor. All papers will be graded based on grammar, style, extent to which supporting evidence is appropriately cited, and extent to which an understanding of the texts is demonstrated.

If this class is selected to participate in the university-wide WAC assessment program, you will be required to access the online assessment server, complete the consent form and survey, and submit electronically a first and final draft of a near-end-of-term paper.

You will be required to analyze one newspaper article on a current event that relates to the course material, lead a class discussion on the topic, and submit a written (400-600 words typed) analysis of the article. You should present your analysis to the class on your scheduled day and hand it in at the end of class.

Group 1: Race and Ethnicity, Language and Culture, Kinship, Descent, and Marriage; Gender.

Group 2: Religion, Ritual, Performance, and Art, Globalization, Applied, and Medical Anthropology.

Grading: Your grade will be evaluated based on your overall effort and participation in the course, turning in writing assignments on time, effort toward improvement of your writing, and your overall performance on assignments.
